RESIDENT SHOWCASE - MEET FRANK & MATILDA TRANZOW!

Frank was born in Grosse Pointe Farms, Michigan, on the kitchen table of his Tranzow grandparents' home. In 1939, after the birth of his brother Jerry, the family moved to Port Huron, Michigan. They lived behind a Sunoco service station on St. Clair River and Military Street, purchased by Grandpa Tranzow in 1940.

In anticipation of sister Rebecca's birth in 1944, and following the passing of Frank's grandparents, the family moved into a new home. The birth of brother K. Lee brightened Frank's senior year in high school. Frank attended Port Huron schools and graduated in January 1955, as part of the last mid-year graduating class.

During his senior year, Frank earned an appointment to the U.S. Naval Academy. However, during his final medical exam, he was disqualified due to needing glasses. He was then offered a spot in the first class of the U.S. Air Force Academy, but a more advanced eye exam again disqualified him. Instead, Frank joined the Naval Reserve and enrolled at the University of Michigan.

He majored in Chemical Engineering and graduated in June 1959. During his time there, he worked three jobs—night motel clerk, nurses' dormitory busboy, and party gift salesman for sororities—to help fund his education. He later earned a master's degree in business management.

In 1956, Frank met Till MacCarthy on a blind date. They reconnected during summer school in 1959, had their second date in September, and married a year later in September 1960. Till, a registered nurse, supported Frank through his final semester.

Till was born in New Jersey and spent 12 years in Maplewood. Her fondest memories were summers at her family's beach house in Madison, Connecticut, where she enjoyed swimming and tennis.

In 1952, Till's father became the first Director of Development for the University of Michigan, prompting the family to move to Ann Arbor. She quickly developed a love for Michigan football, attending games at the Big House with her father,



who held four season tickets.

Till started working early—as a babysitter earning 25 cents an hour. At age 15, she became a waitress at the Michigan Union (women had to use the side entrance). Her favorite part of the job was serving meals to the Michigan football team during training. She later worked as a nurse's aide at the University Hospital, which inspired her to pursue nursing school.

During their early years together, extensive medical testing revealed that Frank and Till were unable to conceive children. In early 1965, they began the adoption process. Around the same time, Frank was offered a job transfer to Kansas City. During a nervous meeting with the adoption agency, they learned that a child had already been planned for them.

Four years into busy and fulfilling careers, the arrival of their daughter Sally changed their lives. Nancy, William, and Steve soon followed, all born in Kansas City. Their four children brought them immense joy. Sadly, Sally passed away from cancer at age 34, and Steve died of a massive heart attack at 52. Nancy, now 58, is a survivor of a rare leukemia, and William is healthy and living in Nevada. Their three grandchildren are thriving in Southern California.

In December 1960, on his return from a final job interview, Frank decided to accept an offer from Procter & Gamble. However, upon arriving home, Till informed him that an accountant had called wanting to speak with him. Out of curiosity, Frank returned the call at 9 p.m., which led to a 20-year career with a CPA firm. Startin in Detroit, his management consulting work to the family to four major cities. During that tim the firm's practice grew 375-fold.

Frank loved the diversity of consulting work, but eventually became disinterested in the administrative side of practice management ar resigned. Confident in his prospects, he launch an entrepreneurial path with several noncompete consulting opportunities in hand.

Over the next 20 years, Frank directed the purchase or sale of 21 closely held companies. recruited managers and stockholders (up to eig per company), served as Board Chairman, and oversaw financial and long-term planning. Till and Frank's travels took them around the world—visiting friends, sightseeing, golfing, an experiencing life in 65 countries across Europe

MAINTENANCE/LANDSCAPING ANNOUNCEMENTS WINDOW WASHING

Since we have had so much rain, we have held off on exterior windows and are looking to get this scheduled mid-July or beginning of August. Please stay tuned!

MOWING ALONG DITCH – CITY BOND

Our drainage ditches are controlled and maintained by the New Mercer Ditch Company and the City of Fort Collins. All mowing, mosquito spraying and other oversight is done by these two entities.

LANDSCAPING UPDATE

Thanks to an unusually rainy season, our plants and flowers are taking a little longer to bloom this year. As summer progresses and the weather evens out, you'll start to see more vibrant growth and color returning to your yards. Our dedicated landscaping team is working on a rotating schedule across all properties and will get to each area for weeding, maintenance, and general upkeep as soon as possible.

We truly appreciate your patience and understanding as nature (and our team) catch up!

Maintenance can assist with hanging personal items as time allows and will provide basic hardware. Any hardware beyond what we consider basic (shelves, nuts, bolts, hangers, TV mount, etc.) for personal use should be supplied by the tenant. Grab bars are supplied and installed free of charge.

Reminder: Maintenance is available on-call for emergent needs on weekends and after hours. Some examples of a maintenance emergency include Air conditioning or heat not working, no hot water, water leaks or flooding, and egress-related issues. Note: If your smoke detector is alarming and saying "fire" or "carbon monoxide", please contact 911, do not contact the front desk.

Please do not put nails in any of the doors, woodwork, or cupboards. You may find which hooks are acceptable by checking with maintenance first.

Maintenance is not allowed to work on personal appliances, move tenants' furniture, flip mattresses, or work on residents' automobiles or electric scooters.
